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## Violence erupts as Mexican authorities raid campuses seized by irate students

The recent protests over curriculum changes in Michoacan, Mexico turned violent as authorities raided

campuses seized by students angry about changes in their curriculum.

The raids began on Monday, 15th as the police's patience with the protesters began to wear thin. In recent weeks,

the students torched dozens of delivery trucks, hurled explosives and stones at authorities attempting to quell the upheaval. 176 strikers were subsequently detained by authorities as the violence came to its most intense point since it began weeks ago.

Students seized the teacher's college campuses to protest curriculum changes that would require them to take English and Computer Science courses, which the students see as unnecessary since their key demographic is rural areas where such skills are not needed.

The students hijacked several delivery trucks and moved them to the campuses that had already been

Vote early.

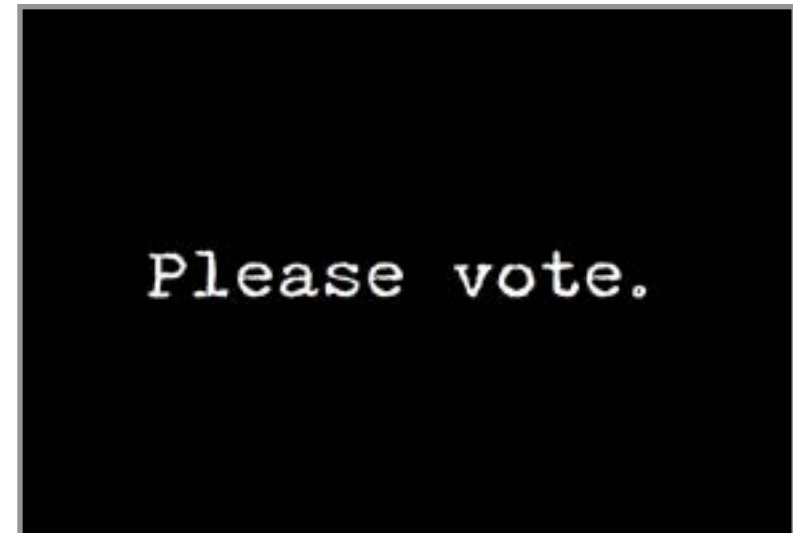
You know you can go to any early voting location and cast your ballot if you register on October 22. It only takes a few minutes out of your day to make your voice heard.

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# Racism: An Interview with Cherry Steinwender

Cherry Steinwender, Co-Executive Director

The Center for the Healing of Racism

At a recent workshop offered by The Center for the Healing of Racism, I had the opportunity of interviewing its Executive Director, Cherry Steinwender.

The Centers main goal is to create a safe and supportive environment for attendees to share their feelings about the issues. Sharing is voluntary and every one can feel secure knowing that their comments are confidential.

1) What are the greatest obstacles we face today when trying to overcome the intolerance we feel towards others?

"Denial. Refusing to examine the possibility that racism still exists and refusing to talk about it. Refusing to believe people of color when they share their own stories about stereotypes and racism with people who are different from them, is another great obstacle".

2) What would you say to those who believe in your cause, but feel that their voice or work wouldn't

make a difference?

"I believe we are NOT doomed to repeat the mistakes of the past. To make things happen, you must believe that you were chosen to make a difference in the world. Hold on tight to hope, but also roll up your sleeves and act. Doing nothing will guarantee that nothing will happen"

3) What advice would you give to those who propagate intolerance and hatred towards specific groups?

"We haven't really learned or internalized that we are all one people. Today's rhetoric comes right out of our heads. We have the concept of oneness, but only in our minds. We have to move all

the stuff in our heads to our hearts, where we can really believe in what we think."

4) Do you believe you have made a true difference in those you are able to reach?

"I am aware that this is an uphill battle, but it is a worthwhile one. As people become more aware of their racial conditioning, you are able to touch their hearts. People walk up to me and say "you've changed my life" all the time. Workshop participants begin living more inclusive lives; they begin to educate themselves, socialize, date and marry outside of their racial or ethnic "comfort zones."

5) Besides electing a colored President to the White House, what

else can people do to chip away at racial inequality?

"We must all abandon the fear of self-examination as well as the refusal to openly discuss racism. After the 2008 election, the media went into a frenzy, using phrases like "post-racial America", and this infuriated me because the election of Barak Obama did not mean that racism had disappeared. When Houston elected its first openly-lesbian mayor, it did not do away with homophobia.

6) Besides racism, what other social issues do you explore with workshop participants?

"There is a wide spectrum of issues we touch on. We discuss bullying, social inequality, gender inequality, homophobia, xenophobia, stereotypes, and because embracing diversity is key to the healing process, we also make great efforts to spotlight and develop a greater application of the various cultural practices that exist in our community."

# Senator Mario Gallegos, UHD's voice in legislature, dead at 62

State Senator and UHD ambassador Mario Gallegos passed away Tuesday, October 17, following complications associated with his 2007 liver transplant.

Sen. Gallegos, a Democratic lawmaker with 22 years in Texas Legislature, had a career marked by controversy and commitment to the issues he found most pertinent. A graduate of UHD, he served a strong voice for the university in the legislature.

As the first Hispanic elected to the Senate from Harris County, he worked to resolve issues in the

Hispanic community despite his numerous health issues, going so far as to install a hospital bed in the office of the Senate seargent-at-arms in order to vote against a bill requiring voter identification. He argued that the bill would discriminate against voters.

Gallegos has been described by fellow Senators as "a man of matchless generosity" as well as "a man who...fought hard for the underdog".

Gallegos is survived by his wife, Theresa, three children, and five grandchildren.

# Conservative Student Group wins Free Speech Case

## Palm Beach students fight for their right to exercise free speech

A student group at Palm Beach State College has won a two year long free speech based case against the university. Young Americans for Freedom v. Bryant, which was originally brought before the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of Florida has finally come to a settlement that requires the University to revise its speech code to better allow students to exercise free speech.

In 2010, the student group, Young Americans for Freedom (YAF), was instructed by administrators to cease distribution of flyers provide to the by the Heritage Foundation, a national "public policy research institute" founded by radio personality and political commentator Rush Limbaugh. Allegedly, the students were told by school administrations that they were not allowed to distribute flyers in the school's "free speech zone", a designated area created by some universities to allow students to freely express social and political opinions.

The incident began when club president, Christina Beattie, was told by administrators that the organization was not allowed to

participate in the school's annual Club Rush, an event held by many colleges where student organizations are allowed to recruit new members, which usually requires permission from school administration. Christina explained that she had been given verbal permission by an unnamed official, but was still not allowed to participate until written, official permission documents were produced, which required official registration. When Christina began to seek official permission, she was told by the staff of the Student Activities Office that organizations were not permitted to distribute literature under the college's speech code.

The organization filed suit in 2011 and was represented by the legal counsel of Alliance Defending Freedom (ADF), a Christian, non-profit organization that has a goal of "building an alliance to keep the door open for the spread of the Gospel by transforming the legal system and advocating for religious liberty, the sanctity of life, and marriage and family", according to their website. Upon further investigation, the ADF lawyers found that PBSC's speech code was one of the most restrictive among public universities. As a part of the code, flyer distribution and off-

campus activities after 9pm or on weekends were without two week advanced permission from the dean and at least two adult college staff members present strictly prohibited. As part of a provision by the suit, PBSC was ordered to eliminate permission requirements for public speech and flyer distribution.

PBSC is not the only university whose speech policies have caused controversy. In 2011, Yale University prohibited their freshman class from using the names of Bill Gates, Mark Zuckerberg and Matt Damon on their

Freshman Class Council Harvard-Yale shirt under the university's "Use of Name" code. The policy specifies the context in which the university's trademark can be used. The ADF's recent crackdown on restrictive university speech policies has included University of California at Los Angeles, Virginia Tech and the University of Alabama, and 40 other colleges. The schools have decided to alter their speech policies to better protect the student population.

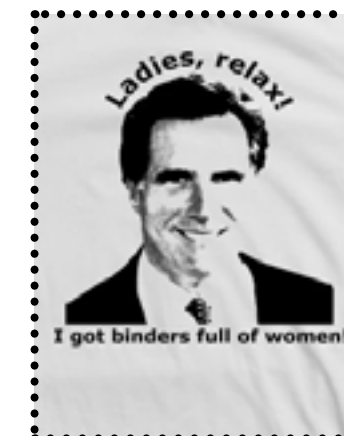

long chosen not to intervene in the protests due to the concept of "university autonomy", which allows colleges to run their own affairs, including controlling upheavals. However, the authorities were forced to intervene after the incident began to affect common citizens not in any way involved in the protests. The student's took over toll booths and blocked highways, preventing people from going to their jobs.

The protests have also begun to affect students not involved in it. The students are forced to hold classes in tents and soccer fields, and many have expressed their frustration over the deplorable conditions in which they hold classes under. The students complain of flooding in the tents after rainfall and the lack of the necessary facilities, such as computers. Many students also fear that future employers will steer clear of them simply because they attended the college and will somehow associate them with the violence.

The recent upheaval brings back bitter memories of past protests, some of which have erupted into violence, such as the Tlatelolco massacre in 1968, which resulted in the death of several civilians.

Now, however, you can simply type a name on the social networks "friend finder" or search page and find yourself instantly connected to that person, given that you get accepted. While social networks can begin as a harmless aim at finding lost friends, it can end in a hurtful way if it is not used wisely.

For example, the media has exposed many politicians and celebrity figures as unfaithful and liars. Most of the time, the audience is the first person to know this tragic episode before their families, friends, and respective partners find out. Not so far from these respected and public figures is the average person who opens a social network with the intention to find friends whom they have lost contact with. While they have good intentions, others might not. Constant check-ins and status updates give these "friends" the right to see into your life. They become virtual friends, that you can't see and in some instances you can't even meet to have a face-to-face conversation. This form of communication decreases your ability to form bonds with people and increases the bond one has with a virtual friend via the internet.

Regardless of the "privacy controls" you have placed on your page, you forget that once you add these friends, your information becomes

their information as well, and let's be honest; most of us know at least one person who has more than 300 friends. These strangers, because they cannot be called friends if you have not met them in person, have complete access to your pictures, comments, status, and even the places where you have been. But how do you know that this person actually exists? Have you met them in person or have they shown proof, besides the pictures, that they are real? The answer is that you cannot prove the person's existence unless you meet them. That is not to say that I am encouraging anyone to set up a meeting with these strangers, but it would be wise to start thinking twice about adding that physically attractive person who just so happens to have found you.

It is hard to think that all of those care free and party moments could one day cost someone their job, but it's true. When a company hires a person, they expect that person to be a mature and professional adult. You may have outgrown the parties and the drinking, but what happens when your boss or a co-worker runs into a picture of you in a compromising situation? Obviously, you cannot use the "I was young, I didn't know what I was doing excuse," because your boss will most likely ask if you were forced to act in that way. But what does your past life have to do with your job? Well, once you start working for someone, you become a representative for that business. Even if you delete the compromising information from the page, the information is not completely gone. In cyberspace, nothing is ever deleted



but merely erased from one site. While more and more people trust social networks, they ignore the idea that among their friends there might be a cyber criminal. This cyber criminal uses your pictures and other information you have posted on your page, to create a false profile in order to cyber stalk and harm others. This is a form of identity theft because this person has become you without your knowledge. Did you know that social networking was primarily created for the purpose of making money? While you are adding information on your profile, the cookies on your computer save your

information for the purpose of tracking your activities; that way businesses can understand the demands of the people and create advertisements that will catch your attention.

While social networks can ruin romantic relationships, ruin the reputation of public figures, cost a person their job, and steal a person's identity: the good news is that social networks are helping real life friends and family members to keep in touch. Just be careful with what you publish, because remember: nothing is truly erased in cyberspace.

the website of a company that she claims she never gave permission to photograph her or use her photos for any purpose.

Ms. Ahmed is an international business student who will be graduating this spring, as well as the founder of the UHD cheerleading squad. She is also currently a litigation assistant for a law firm, and she is planning to attend law school in

the fall.

It is common for potential employers, future clients, and admissions boards to search the internet for any mention of the person they seek as a business partner or student. Thus, Ms. Ahmed can possibly be hindered in her advancement through academic, legal, or business circles because of one ill-advised decision that she made several years ago.

This situation warrants further investigation due to the serious

implications that it holds for this young woman's future. Beyond that, hopefully it will serve as a warning to current students. Think carefully before you take any picture on your cell phone, upload any video to Youtube, post any Facebook message, send any email, or add any new tweet to your Twitter account. Once something is on the internet, it can forever be accessed by anyone and used against you at any time.

represents, of course...but what about the word P.A.T.R.O.L?

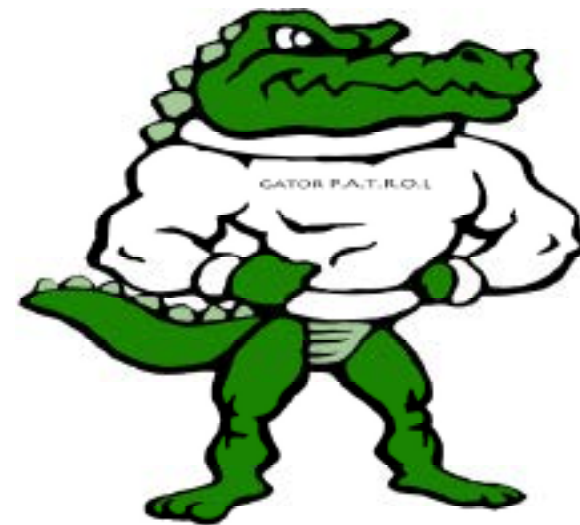
Well, P.A.T.R.O.L is actually an acronym that stands for our motto:

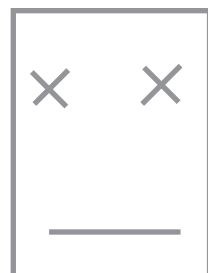

### UHD CPD Forum: Shaping Our Future, How Should Higher Education Help us Create the Society We Want?

University of Houston-Downtown's Center for Public Deliberation (UHD CPD) will host two two-session forums entitled Shaping Our Future, How Should Higher Education Help Us Create the Society We Want?

The goal of this forum is to bring together a diverse group of people to discuss their perspectives and to set the agenda for higher education at the national level.

Participants in the two two-part sessions will consider together higher education's role in society.

Three specific options will be posed for the forum participates to discuss in the context of a broader discussion of the role higher education plays.

Option 1: Higher

education should help the economy stay internationally competitive.

Option #2: Higher education should teach responsibility and integrity and help us work together.

Option #3: Higher education should help ensure that we have a fairer society.

The event is organized by Dr. Windy Lawrence, Associate Professor of Communications Studies and UHD CPD Co-Director and Founder, as well as students enrolled in COMM 3318 - Facilitating Public Deliberation.

Students enrolled in Comm. 3318 learn about the history, theory and practice of public deliberation in U.S. communities. The course culminates with the students leading one deliberation in the

American Commonwealth Partnership, an organization that is working closely with over 300 forums across the U.S. and education leaders in D.C. to set the agenda for higher education. People who come to our forums will be asked to make hard choices and to consider difficult trade-offs.

Our communication 3318 students will compile the results into a final report which will be submitted as part of a national discussion. When people in our community decide to participate in this forum they are effectively saying, 'I need to be a part of the decision-making facing higher education-it is not enough to let policy makers do this without my perspectives and other perspectives in my community.'

The first forum will be held on November 6, (9:50 am-11:15 am) and November 8 (9:50 am-11:15 am). The second forum will be held on November 13 (9:50 am-11:15 am) and November 20 (9:50 am-11:15 am) in the Commerce Building, Room 222.

Through his experience he met many other mascots from various states. He likes to keep in contact; they network on new ways to keep the energy up in the crowd.

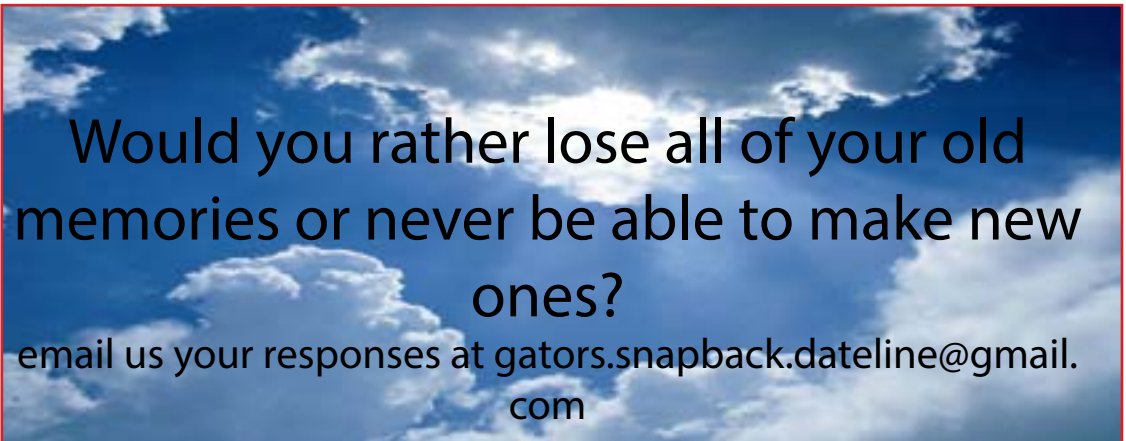
