- At UHD we defined "first-year" as having earned fewer than 30 SCHs and "senior" as having earned 90+ SCHs.
- At UHD the NSSE was taken by 227 first-year students (15%, 60% female, 75% full time) and 784 seniors (19%, 70% female, 56% full time).
- NSSE results included comparisons with four groups of institutions that administered the NSSE in Spring, 2013:
 - \odot All other institutions that administered the NSSE
 - Institutions in UHD's Carnegie basic classification (Baccalaureate/Diverse Fields)
 - \odot Public institutions in the southwest region
